- A staff person brings in her 2-month-old baby for us to see.

All these members who serve us are "persons of interest" because each has a story to tell during their service here. Of course there are lots of people not mentioned. All I can conclude is that God is here at St. Dominic Villa serving us through our helpers and I am grateful.

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Re-Purpose Stained-Glass Windows?

I have recently been working on several projects, but the one that is most endearing required me to repurpose some stained glass windows. In 2022, the bishop of Columbus, Earl Fernandes, decided to convert our campus Newman Center from the Paulist Fathers to Diocesan Priests. Along with this change, the beautiful stained-glass windows were scheduled to be replaced, and some of them were going to be trashed or sold to antique dealers. This, among many other changes, caused many of the parishioners to become "Newman refugees."

I was able to help one donor reclaim the window dedicated to her late husband. We decided to create smaller crosses with doves for her and her friends. This project has been a true "labor of love" for me and for members of our displaced Newman Center community in Columbus.

After the original crosses were created, others in the community have requested that I continue to use the reclaimed Newman windows and repurpose them into smaller artworks that can be displayed in their homes. This will keep me busy into 2025. However, I consider it a privilege to create such artworks that will help heal the wounds and bitterness.

Furthermore, in 2025 I hope to help organize workshops where former Newman Center members can create their own stained-glass mementos from the original windows.




Stories in Pictures


Recognizing the uncertain and chaotic times in which we find ourselves, the Visioning Committee of the Dominican Sisters Conference (DSC) determined that "Preachers for Times Such as These" be the theme for both the October 2024 Leadership Assembly and for the projected 2025 Assembly of Members. The theme comes from the book of Esther (4:14) where Esther is told that "silence is no longer an option" and that, in God's providence, she may have been placed in a position of influence "for times such as these."

Our adaptation of the passage from the Book of Esther 4:14:

"If we are silent in times such as these, relief and deliverance for your people will arise from another source, but you, my sister, and the Dominican charism may not make it through the chaos. Could it be? Perhaps we (you) have become Dominican Preachers for times such as these." Esther 4:14

After soliciting from the artists of the **Dominican Institute for the Arts**, "Artistic Renderings" illustrates the urgent need for the Dominican charism for "times such as these." The request was enthusiastically received, and this show is the result of their efforts. Below are photos of two of the entries that appeared in the exhibit. The OPalette staff thanks all the artists who contributed and will continue to include other works of art in subsequent issues.




Cheryl Liske, OP Adrian Title: *"Lamenting Christ in the midst of Chaos"* Medium: Photo Collage with attached wood carving
